## FINANCIAL AID

Calumet College of St. Joseph participates in federal and state financial aid programs. The College also makes available institutional funds for those who qualify. In order to be eligible for federal, state, and institutional aid, all students must complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Students can apply using the paper form, however, the quickest method to apply is online at [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov). Please be sure to enter CCSJ's school code of 001834 so that your FAFSA is received by our Financial Aid Office. After completing the FAFSA, students will be contacted in regards to their financial aid and further paperwork may be required.

The Indiana FAFSA filing deadline for Indiana State Financial Aid is March 10th. This is important for all Indiana residents. If the State Student Assistance Commission of Indiana (SSACI) does not receive your FAFSA by March 10th, you will not be eligible for state aid. After the March 10th deadline, students may receive state part-time grants only if they meet all requirements and sufficient funds are available.

In keeping with the State of Indiana Refund Policy, if during the first 4 weeks of the semester, a student drops below full-time (12 or more credit hours), his or her full-time state grant(s) will be forfeited. A part-time grant may then be awarded to the student if funds are available. Federal and institutional aid may also be removed or reduced.

If the student drops all classes and is refunded all tuition charges, all state financial aid will be canceled and the student is responsible for paying the tuition amount. Federal aid and institutional aid will also be cancelled. Any student who withdraws from all classes may also be subject to a balance due on his or her account. The Department of Education requires a calculation to determine how much of the student's financial aid the College can use towards any remaining tuition charges.

Satisfactory Academic Progress standards will be reviewed at the end of each semester. Please refer to the Student Handbook or the Refund Policy available in the Office of Financial Aid for more information. Questions may also be addressed to the Office of Financial Aid at (219) 473-4296.

# PAYMENT OPTIONS

## Payment Options

1. **Pay in full** - All tuition and fees are due in full by the first day of class each term. Additionally, any remaining balance that will be due after financial aid is applied is due by the first day of class.
2. **Deferred payment plan** - Student accounts with balances due are referred to the Director of Student Accounts for resolution.
3. **Tuition reimbursement policy** - A waiver will be provided to any student providing proof that Calumet College will receive tuition reimbursement directly from his or her employer. Any balance not directly reimbursable to the College must be paid in full by the first day of class.

Balances can include but are not limited to tuition, fees, bookstore charges, library fines, and adjustments to accounts. The College accepts the following: bank drafts, personal checks, money orders, Discover, Visa and Mastercard. Payments, other than cash or credit cards, should be made payable to Calumet College of St. Joseph. Payments can be dropped off in the Business Office, its mailbox at the main campus or mailed to:

If an account is forwarded to collections, the student will be responsible for all costs associated with the collection of the outstanding balance.

## Returned check Policy

A \$50 returned check fee will be charged to the student's account for any returned check. Only two (2) returned checks will be processed. Thereafter, personal checks will no longer be accepted. Returned checks must be paid within ten (10) business days of non-payment.

## Federal Refund Policy Financial Aid Requirements

Any student who withdraws on or before 60 percent of the semester has elapsed and who receives Title IV awards, such as Pell Grants, SEOG or other federal aid (excluding Federal Work Study), will be subject to a federal formula when calculating refunds. The formula calculates aid based on the percent of time the student was enrolled in class during the semester. All unearned aid will be returned to the Federal Government. The College and/or the student may be required to return some of the funds awarded.

The student's withdrawal date is defined as the date the student begins the withdrawal process or the date official notice is provided to the College. If no withdrawal process is initiated, the date of withdrawal is set at the mid-point of the semester.

**State Refund Policy Financial Aid Requirements**

Any student qualifying for state aid who withdraws within the first four weeks of the semester is not entitled to state aid. All state monies will be returned.

**Student Refunds**

Remaining refund balances due to the student will be mailed to the address on file in the Office of the Registrar. Any student requesting that the credit balance remain in their account should file a refund form that can be obtained in the Financial Aid Office. The balance can then be applied against future charges during the current school year. On the last day of each school year, all credit balances due to financial aid will be refunded to the student.

## Disability Services

CCSJ seeks to provide opportunities for equal access in programs, services and activities. Students with documented disabilities requiring support to access academic activities are encouraged to contact Student Support Services. CCSJ and Student Support Services strive to meet the needs of all students, providing academic services in accordance with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) guidelines. The ADA states that a disability "must place substantial limitations on an individual's major life activities." There are three categories of persons with disabilities:

1. Individuals who have a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities;
2. Individuals who have a record of a physical or mental impairment that substantially limited one or more of the individual's major life activities; and
3. Individuals who are regarded as having such an impairment, whether they have the impairment or not

The following are examples of services which are available:

- \* Readers, notetakers;
- \* Coordination of classroom and testing accommodations;
- \* Alternative format of text;
- \* Tutoring;
- \* Counseling; and
- \* Referral to community organizations.

Students must meet with a staff member from Student Support Services to complete the Intake Form to request accommodations and/or auxiliary aids. The accommodation requests must be completed at least one month prior to enrollment for each academic term. It is the student's responsibility to contact the Student Support Services office to request accommodations. When requesting accommodations, students are to provide professional documentation of their disability.

# Undergraduate Program

## Bachelor of Science in Public Safety Management

### MISSION:

The Public Safety Management curriculum is structured in an accelerated format to develop public safety professionals capable of meeting the constant changes they will encounter in their respective workplaces. It is a competency-based education program that prepares students to become able communicators, critical and synthetic thinkers, and life-long learners.

The program embraces and promotes diversity in all areas, respecting diverse academic levels, faith traditions, and social-economic backgrounds. The faculty and staff are committed to the innovative education of the whole person, keeping in focus each student as a returning adult who contributes unique experience and knowledge. The faculty and staff's methodology, teaching, and role modeling determine the expectations we have for our students: respecting others, seeking knowledge actively, and utilizing the skills and foundations needed for effective management in public safety settings.

### DELIVERY MODEL:

Each class consists of six sessions which meet one day per week for three and one half hours (3 ½) hours. The evening sessions meet from 6:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. at the Chicago Police Academy. Students attending classes in an Indiana or South Suburban location meet from 6:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. There is no morning session for the Indiana or South Suburban cohorts.

# Graduate Program Public Safety Administration

## MISSION:

The Public Safety Administration Program has a strong theoretical focus combined with practical applications for persons who are interested in the dynamic study of public safety. The program is designed to prepare graduates to offer innovative leadership and to manage personnel in crisis and non-crisis situations. The capstone enables students to apply research in a private or public setting to solve a public safety problem. The thesis tract option enhances the student's preparation for doctoral graduate study by providing additional opportunities to master the knowledge and skills necessary to conduct research.

## DELIVERY MODEL:

Designed for working professionals, students attend one, four hour class session each week. Classes are held day and evening allowing students to attend either session. The curriculum is sequenced so that students take one course at a time for a seven week time period. Adding to the success of the program is the cohort model of delivery whereby students start and end the program as a group, forming relationships and support throughout the program.
