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Responsibilities	
Attending Class	<p>If you miss a class, the number of points lost is large. Discussion points (70% of a letter grade) and quiz points (50% of a letter grade) are missed. Turning In Your Work	<p>Assigned essays are collected in class the night they are due. If they are not provided at this time, they are deemed late. I will generally accept late papers, but they will be penalized for tardiness. Timely papers will be returned the following week. Late papers will be graded and returned as my schedule allows.</p> <p>All outstanding work must be submitted no later than the final class session for it to be considered.</p> <p>I prefer paper copies of your work so that I can make comments in the margins, if needed, but you can certainly e-mail them to me if that works better for you.</p>
Using Electronic Devices	<p>Electronic devices can only be used in class for course-related purposes. If you text or access the Internet for other purposes, you may be asked to leave, in which case you will be marked absent.</p> <p>I didn't write this rule, but I would like to comment on it: Sometimes stuff happens. A spouse's car breaks down, a parent is in need of care, or a kid gets sick and you need to be in touch with them. I get it. If this is the case, let me know and we will figure something out. However, if it is behavior that is continual, excessive, disruptive or disrespectful, that is another matter entirely and the rule will be enforced.</p>
Participating in Class	<p>You must be on time, stay for the whole class and speak up in a way that shows you have done the assigned reading. A little over a third of your grade rests on class participation.</p>
Doing Your Own Work	<p>If you turn in work that is not your own, you are subject to judicial review. These procedures can be found in the College Catalog and the Student Planner. The maximum penalty for any form of academic dishonesty is dismissal from the College.</p> <p>Using standard citation guidelines, such as MLA or APA format, to document sources avoids plagiarism. The Library has reference copies of each of these manuals, and there are brief checklists in your Student Handbook and Planner.</p> <p>PLEASE NOTE: All papers may be electronically checked for plagiarism.</p>
