<p>Learning Outcomes/ Competencies: Upon successful completion of this course, students will</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Know and understand the history of painting • Learn and improve skills with color theory, mixing theories, brushwork and material usages • Understand the importance of painting in a historical as well as contemporary art world <p><i>The course also meets the following General Education Program objectives:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Students will be able to orally deliver a presentation with a clear central idea that is logically developed, supported by convincing evidence and valid reasoning, and expressed using language and delivery choices thoughtfully adapted to the audience. • Students will appreciate, create, and critique the persuasive power of art and media. • Students develop ability to objectively and subjectively evaluate work in an art discipline. 	
<p>Course Description: This course will give students the basic skills in painting in, acrylics, and watercolors. Students will learn to mix paints, prime painting surfaces, preserve finished works, and prepare works for exhibition. Students will learn color and compositional theory, as well as the basic theory necessary to write a thoughtful and reflective artist’s statement to accompany their work.</p>	
<p>Learning Strategies: Brainstorming, guided demonstrations, videos, films, image presentations, hands-on experimentation, focused exploration, free exploration, modeling, guest speakers, lectures, group discussions, field trips, collaborative play, creative inquiry, case studies, design thinking methodology.</p> <p>Work in basic color theory, composition, sketching, and material handling will culminate with a final painting or paintings, based on skills acquired over the course, as well as a thoughtful artist’s statement. While much of the course work will be done in the classroom, students are expected to practice and produce work on their own as well. Students will produce a large number of practice and preparatory studies and sketches.</p> <p>The course is split into three sections, as follows:</p> <p>1. Preparing to Paint Color theory, color mixing Preparing canvas, paper, and panel Brush control Preparatory sketching and composition</p>	

2. Material Handling

Material Safety

In oil painting, there are a few safety concerns that must be addressed, and rules that must be followed to ensure student safety. Caution and common sense are called for whenever using any artist oil paint, but certain paints require extra precautions. These are any lead-based whites, Chemnitz White, Flake White, Flemish White, as well as Cadmium, Malachite, and Cobalt oil colors. Wash hands thoroughly after handling any oil color and never ingest. Many painters wear latex or nitrile gloves to avoid any contact and gloves should always be worn when grinding your own paint.

Linseed Oil is also a material we must be careful handling. Linseed oil is a naturally drying oil that can combust when rags, soaked in linseed oil, are exposed to air and the oil combines with the oxygen molecules. This chemical reaction creates heat. If the linseed oil is on something like a cotton rag or paper towel, it can catch fire at as low as 120 degrees F. The right amount of ventilation and atmosphere can cause linseed oil and paint rags to easily self-ignite. Rags, paper towels, etc., soaked with linseed oil must be disposed of in a tightly sealed metal can. You also can add water to the can to help prevent spontaneous combustion. Always tightly seal the lid.

Any student violating these safety rules puts themselves, their classmates, and the College at risk, and will be removed from the course!!!
