Instructor Background: Susannah Papish is a Chicago-based artist and curator who earned a MFA in Painting and Drawing from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago and a BA in Art History from the University of Illinois at Chicago. Papish is Director of boundary, a contemporary visual arts project space begun in 2017 and located in her garage in Morgan Park, a far south-side neighborhood in Chicago. Also In 2017, Papish was the recipient of the 3Arts Make a Wave grant. Her work has been exhibited at many Chicago-based spaces including solo shows at Skestos Gabriele Gallery and the Beverly Arts Center. She has been a recipient of grants from the Department of Cultural Affairs and the Illinois Arts Council. She has taught at several colleges and universities in the Chicago area, currently teaching at Calumet College of St. Joseph in Whiting, IN. Opening in August 2020, Papish will represent boundary in the exhibition Artists Run Chicago 2.0 at the Hyde Park Art Center.

Learning Outcomes/ Competencies: Drawing 1

- 1. Provide each student with specific drawing media experiences.
- 2. Build basic perceptual skills in terms of drawing from studio set-ups.
- 3. Students gain basic knowledge of the elements of art: line, value, shape/volume, texture, color.
- 4. Students gain a working knowledge of design principles: balance, rhythm, pattern, emphasis, contrast, unity and movement
- 5. Students will explore different types of spatial illusion, compositions, and expressive meaning.
- Students will analyze visual information in terms of proportional relationships, spatial
 relationships and basic geometric shapes in order to accurately depict objects and groupings of
 objects.
- 7. Students will use shading (continuous tones, cross contour, cross-hatching and stippling) to create the illusion of volume, depth, and the natural way light describes form.
- 8. Students will describe texture and organic rhythms drawing using approaches such as still life objects, landscape and portraiture.
- 9. Students will execute one-and two-point perspective drawings.
- 10. Students will use a variety of tools and techniques spontaneously to interpret ideas in various intuitive and expressive ways.
- 11. Students will discuss drawing using a commonly understood terminology.
- 12. Students will learn about past and contemporary artists.
- 13. Students will present their completed work in a professional manner.

The course also meets the following General Education Program objectives:

- Students will be able to orally deliver a presentation (critique) with a clear central idea that is logically developed, supported by convincing evidence and valid reasoning, and expressed using language and delivery choices thoughtfully adapted to the audience.
- Students will appreciate, create, and critique the persuasive power of art and media.
- Students develop ability to objectively and subjectively evaluate work in an art discipline.

Course Description: ARTS 160. Drawing 1 is an experiential learning course in drawing for the general education student as well as art majors. Students learn the fundamentals of drawing realistically from life, including drawing edges, spaces, relationships, values, and color. Students will draw the traditional subjects of still life, landscape, and the portrait working with both linear and mass drawing materials. (This course is a CCSJ General Education option in Humanities.)

Demonstrations image presentations, hands-on experimentation, focused exploration, free exploration.
